

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EX GW EX Great Western #60 now owned by the Black River & Western, a short line excursion run in New Jersey, hauled a 12 car consist of mixed LIRR passenger cars including a Coach Club car, a combination baggage-coach, the parlor car "Oneida Club" and the open end observation and former business car Havpalm (No. 97) of the Central Railroad of New Jersey on a 214-mile excursion under the auspices of the Sag Harbor & Scuttle Hole Railroad on November 24th with approximately 500 passengers.
