

The Golden Spike Centennial Commission, appointed by President Johnson and chairmanned by T. M. Goodfellow, AAR President, on February 5th officially dedicated its new western office at Ogden, Utah. Mr. Goodfellow referred to the opening of this new Commission office as a "kickoff to a long string of activities" culminating in the 100th anniversary of the Golden Spike on May 10, 1969.
