

PROGRAM NOTES: Beyer Patton will present the program this month - slides of "Narrow Gauge Steam RAILROADING IN EQUADOR, COLUMBIA, BOLIVIA, AND BRAZIL." HE WILL ALSO SHOW SOME SLIDES ON THE TRANS-CONTINENTAL PANAMA RAILROAD. THIS PROMISES TO BE A VERY INTERESTING PROGRAM. COME AND BRING A FRIEND.

'GOLDEN SPIKE' Excursion Train. A steam-powered "Golden Spike Centennial" excursion train will LEAVE NEW YORK MAY 3 FOR A MEANDERING 15-DAY TRIP TO UTAH AND BACK - TOPPED OFF BY SEEING THE MAY 10 REENACTMENT OF THE COMPLETIONS OF THE FIRST TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILROAD A CENTURY AGO.

THE RE-ENACTMENT WILL TAKE PLACE AT PROMONTORY SUMMIT ON THE UTAH DESERT, WHERE A GOLDEN SPIKE WAS DRIVEN ON MAY 10, 1869 TO MARK THE JOINING OF THE UNION PACIFIC FROM THE EAST AND THE CENTRAL (NOW SOUTHERN) PACIFIC FROM THE WEST.

ACCORDING TO PRESIDENT THOMAS GOODFELLOW OF THE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN RAILROADS, THE EXCURSION TRAIN WILL CONSIST OF FIVE COACHES, A TWIN-UNIT DINER, A PARLOR-DOME CAR, AN OBSERVATION CAR AND THREE BAGGAGE CARS. THE LATTER WILL BE EQUIPPED AS DISPLAY CARS ON AMERICAN RAILROADING, GOOD-FELLOW SAID. EACH NIGHT, HE EXPLAINED, THE EXCURSION TRAIN WILL STOP AT A MAJOR CITY AND BE OPENED FOR PUBLIC INSPECTION. PASSENGERS WILL SPEND EACH NIGHT IN HOTELS.

A 1944-MODEL BERKSHIRE-TYPE STEAM LOCOMOTIVE WILL HAUL THE TRAIN FOR MOST OF THEPTRIP. BETWEEN Kansas City and Salt Lake City, however, a new 6,000 hp Centennial Class diesel will take over.

THE EXCURSION TRAIN, GOODFELLOW REPORTED, WILL BE RUN BY THE HIGH IRON CO., P.O. BOX 200, LEBANON, N. J. 08833 WHICH IS OFFERING PASSAGE AT \$995 PER TICKET, INCLUDING HOTEL ACCOMODATIONS. GOOD-FELLOW IS CHAIRMAN OF THE GOLDEN SPIKE CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION COMMISSION.

SILVERTON FROM THE SILVERTON STANDARD OF JANUARY 30, 1969,

"JERRY A. FISHER, A MILWAUKEE TRANSPORTATION EXPERT, SUBMITTED A STUDY TO THE FOUR CORNERS STANDARD COMMISSION LATE LAST WEEK INDICATING THE SAN JUAN BASIN MAY HAVE A MODERN RAILROAD IN ITS FUTURE - BUT NOT IN THIS GENERATION.

'Fisher sees no future whatsoever in the present Denver and Rio Grande Western narrow gauge line from ALAMOSA THROUGH DURANGO TO FARMINGTON, WHICH RUNS INTERMITTENTLY AS FREIGHT JUSTIFIES. IT IS NOW THE SUBJECT OF AN ABANDONMENT PROCEEDING BEFORE THE INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION. FISHER BELIEVES ULTIMATELY ABANDONMENT OF THE NARROW GAUGE LINE IS INEVITABLE.

'But a modern standard gauge railroad for the San Juan Basin, well, that's aidleferent story, Fisher SAID.

'Once the three Upper Colorado River Basin irrigation projects begin to materialize in the Four Corners area, the first leg of a modern railroad may be feasible, Fisher said in a weekend interview. He believes it will take 15-20 years to make the first link feasible. It would run from Gallup to Farmington, and has already been studied from time to time in the past, Fisher said.

'In another 15-20 years the San Juan Basin country may have grown sufficiently to support another north-south segment of a standard gauge railroad, Fisher said. It would run, he said, from Farm-INGTON NORTH VIA Either Durango or Cortez through Moab and would like up with the current Rio Grande line from Grand Junction to Salt Lake City in eastern Utah.

'Fisher's study was based on the expectation that the Navajo Project in Northwestern New Mexico, the Animas-La Plata and the Dolores Projects in Southwestern Colorado will support a generation hence a vigorous and stable livestock and feed grains industry. This might produce the type of high-value, heavy volume freight in sufficient quantities to support a modern railroad. In the meantime, he said, the area would have to continue to depend exclusively on trucks.

BECAUSE THE AREA IS SO CONSCIOUS OF AIR AND WATER POLLUTION, FISHER SAID IT WAS VERY DOUBTFUL THAT IT WOULD EVER BECOME A MAJOR MANUFACTURING CENTER. BUT IT WILL HAVE A FEW TYPES OF LIGHT INDUSTRY WHICH MIGHT GENERATE LIMITED AMOUNTS OF HEAVY FREIGHT TRAFFIC IN AND OUT OF THE AREA, HE SAID.

MINING MIGHT DO THE SAME THING, HE ADDED. BUT WITHOUT A LARGE VOLUME OF LIVESTOCK ON THE HOOF MOVING TO MARKET, FISHER SAID, A MODERN RAILROAD FOR THE AREA IS NOT IN THE CARDS.

'AND EVEN WHEN THERE IS A STRONG, STABLE LIVESTOCK ECONOMY IN THE AREA, FISHER ADDED, THE AREA PROBABLY WILL BE THE DRIVING FORCE FOR A RAILROAD, NOT THE RAILROAD INDUSTRY.

"FISHER NOTED THERE IS CONSIDERABLE INTEREST IN A RAILROAD IN NEW MEXICO'S SIDE OF THE SAN JUAN BASIN, BUT MUCH LESS INTEREST ON THE COLORADO SIDE.

'Fisher indicated a general lack of cooperation from most of the Colorado sources in his development of the report.

From the Silverton Standard of February 7, 1969, "To a casual observer, it appears that all Durango has done in forfeiting half its railroad yard to a highway interchange is swap a stoplight at Sixth and Main for one at Sixth and Camino del Rio. In fact, going east to west on U.S. 160, you now have two traffic lights instead of one.

AND AGAIN FROM THE SILVERTON STANDARD OF FEBRUARY 7, 1969, "IT REALLY DIDN'T SEEM TO DISTURB ANY-BODY VERY MUCH, BUT AN ERA ENDED IN ASPEN LAST MONTH WHEN THE DENVER AND RIO GRANDE WESTERN RAN ITS LAST FREIGHT TRAIN IN AND OUT OF THAT COMMUNITY AFTER MORE THAT 81 YEARS OF SERVICE. THE TRAIN CONSISTED OF A DOUBLE DIESEL ENGINE, No. 3021, AND A CABOOSE PAUSING BRIEFLY AT THE YARDS TO PICK UP TWO REMAINING EMPTY FREIGHT CARS. THE STANDARD GAUGE TRACKS WILL BE PULLED UP THIS SPRING, AND PART OF THE RIGHT-OF-WAY WILL BE USED FOR SEWAGE OUTFALL LINES. ANOTHER EXAMPLE OF RELATIVITY."

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GOLDEN SPIKE FOUR ENGINES FROM THE VIRGINIA & TRUCKEE RAILROAD ARE BEING PREPARED FOR EXHIBITIONS IN CONNECTION WITH THE UP-SP "GOLDEN SPIKE CENTENNIAL." V&T 12 WILL BECOME CP 60, CELEBRATION AND V&T 11 WILL BE PAINTED AS UP 119, FOR THE PROMONTORY, UTAH CELEBRATION. IN ADDITION, V&T 22 WILL ALSO BECOME THE 60, AND V&T 18 WILL BE 119, THESE LATTER TWO TO BE SET UP ON FLAT CARS, ALONG WITH SOME OTHER OLD-TIME ROLLING STOCK, AND SENT ON A TOUR OF THE ENTIRE UNION PACIFIC SYSTEM AFTER THE MAY 10TH CEREMONY IN UTAH. DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS, DURING JUNE, JULY, AND AUGUST, THERE WILL BE A DAILY RE-ENACTMENT OF THE GOLDEN SPIKE CEREMONY AT PROMONTORY. WE WILL HAVE ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON ACTIVITIES IN UTAH IN OUR NEXT NEWSLETTER.
