

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NARROW GAUGE NEWS is still pending final plans to be worked out by the States. one report was very discouraging recently in a Denver paper to the effect that New Mexico was concerned that there would not be much operating money left after the two States' would put up their allotments. The Rio Grande also put a July 1st deadline on the matter that the States either present them with a plan of purchase or else the entire line would be sold for scrap. At the time of this writing this matter is still pending, with nothing definite.

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MEETING LOCATION CHANGE after the July 8th meeting at Western Federal Savings, will take place effective with our regular August meeting. We have been in the Western Federal Savings building for 10 years, and notice was served a couple months ago that we would not be permitted to hold any meetings in this room after August 1st. The reason for the change in this policy is the Bank Protective Act of 1968 and also they stated that "due to the unrest in the downtown Denver area" they would not be able to provide this area. The Western Federal Savings has been a very good friend of the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club these past years, and we certainly do appreciate what they have done for us too. Also, appreciation should go to the Club Officers that had made the original arrangements for this location, as it has provided us with very nice accomodations.

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STEAM RALLY AT BOULDER of the Steam Power Club was held on June 19-20.
