

PROGRAM NOTES: Mr. Kenneth Jessen will present his very interesting slide show on the little known Denver, Laramie and Northwestern, a railroad whose life span covered a period of only seven years. Ken's presentation will include construction, subsequent bankruptcy and operation under receivership prior to its sale to the Great Western RR. He will give special emphasis to the construction of its grade and the tunnel that is located near Virginia Dale, Colo.

Even the most well thought out plans seem to go haywire on occasion, and so it was with the July program. The motion picture on the ramblings of the NKP steam locomotive No. 759 just didn't make it out here in time so Ed Gerlits dug through his library of "home movies" and treated us with a variety of footage from his 16 mm machine. He had some great "teaser" scenes for the club's Mt. Pleasant, Iowa trip in September showing a recent Midwest Old Settlers and Threshers Reunion at Mt. Pleasant. There was an abundance of beautiful steam powered machines including tractors, trains, threshers, operating models, etc., plus views of the electric streetcar line, the 3 ft. gauge railroad, their big parade and more. Near Boulder, Colorado were scenes of Steam power and threshing on Stu Anderson's farm last year and, from a number of years back, were shots of the NRHS convention special behind steam to Colorado Springs and steam on the Great Western Ry. The beginning of one reel provided a "change of pace" with a number of guided missile firings Ed was involved with during his "Army days." After that sort of "modern stuff" was out of the way, Ed flipped back a few pages of history to show us some intriguing little narrow gauge steam and electric operations south of the border that he located while he was stationed in the southwestern U.S.

THE UNION PACIFIC staged a family day for the UP employees in the region during the middle of July at the company's yards downtown. The railroad had equipment and motive power on display and provided movies, hot dogs and cotton candy for the kids. A large UP hot air balloon floated over the crowd, and several UP passenger cars were used to give rides to employees and their families. The miniature rubber tired UP freight train ran around the grounds, to everyone's amusement.

THE NATIONAL MODEL RAILROAD ASSOCIATION'S Rocky Rails '77 convention held in Denver in July, is now over, and if comments and head counts are good indications, then it can be assumed the affair was quite a success. About 3.500 delegates descended on Currigan Exhibition Hall to view and visit the nearly 300 exhibitors who represented model manufacturers, electronic suppliers, book and magazine publishers, railroads, historical groups, private layouts and collections, and others. Among the displays that seemed to catch the public's eve the most was Herb Votaw's magnificent 1" scale locomotives, one of which was shown on the front page of a Denver newspaper; Turner Brothers Circus, the Colorado Live Steamers, several private and manufacturer's layouts, the N-Trak layout and Jimmy Trowbridge's layout, which was quite popular with the small fry. The N scale layout was quite an accomplishment, consisting of "modules" assembled from all over the country to form one giant loop, 160 ft. by 20 ft. Each module was required to have several through mainline tracks for continuity of the entire layout, and the rest of the individual section could be designed as the owner wished. Many trains were kept running continuously and a long freight train was run often with cars being constantly added. At one point, it almost made it around the pike with 358 cars pulled by one engine! A record-breaking 20,213 visitors from the general public visited the main convention floor between Friday evening and Sunday afternoon. For the members, various activities included clinics, lectures, movie and slide shows: layout, museum and rail tours and several contests took place. The photo contest received almost 500 entries. Saturday evening, 2,800 members sat down for a banquet at the convention facilities. The only "sour" note during the week was provided, courtesy of the Greyhound Bus Company who, instead of leaving the driving to themselves, nearly drove the NMRA transportation committee up the wall, by thoughtfully canceling their contract two weeks before the convention. Fortunately, a potpourri of other companies up and down the front range, were able to send buses from all over, to transport NMRA visitors to the many functions and attractions that had been scheduled. The convention broke records on banquet attendance, attendances by the general public, AND for altitude (yep, one mile above sea level)!!

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A NOTE OF THANKS is due all those volunteers who offered their time to man the club's booth at the NMRA convention. And it was nice to see so many other members and friends stop and say Hi while visiting the show.

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A GOOD PLACE TO STAY while making connections with Amtrak trains at La Junta, Colorado, is recommended by G. W. Pool of Englewood. Mr. Pool found that boarding the Southwest Limited at La Junta is made much easier because of the cooperation and assistance of Mr. Ted Hanson, proprietor of the Heart-of-Town Motel, which is located directly across the street from the Amtrak depot at La Junta. A rail buff in his right, Mr. Hanson will meet Amtrak-bound travelers at the La Junta bus depot and assist with their transfer to the motel or rail depot. Motel patrons may store their autos at the motel without charge while away on the train. (Mr. Hanson was formerly the proprietor of the Iron Horse Motel next to the Colorado Railroad Museum.) The Motel is AAA approved, and rates (which may vary) are \$10 single and \$12 double.


