

As indicated in the announcement included in the May newsletter, the June meeting will be held on Saturday, June 9, at Heritage Square. Our tickets provide for an afternoon of unlimited rides on trains of the High Country Railroad, a Chuck Wagon dinner accompanied with music provided by the Apex Mining Company, and the June program. For the program, John Dillavou will present "Ghosts of Colorado," a photographic visit to over 25 Colorado ghost town sites and several narrow gauge railroad operations. John's program is a music accompanied, narrated presentation.

We should really have a fun afternoon and evening, and remember the many shops and other attractions at the Square. 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MEXICO - FROM A DIFFERENT ANGLE - At the May meeting, Daryl Tennal showed slides of his unforgettable experiences traveling across Mexico with a Mitchell camper caravan. The highlight of the expedition came when they placed their campers on railroad flatcars for a 600 mile trip to the west coast. All sorts of memorable "happenings" occurred during the journey, including one of the campers almost toppling off the train when being loaded, receiving instructions to stay on the train when stopping overnight in a small town or being shot, and Daryl's experience running the locomotive. Thanks Daryl, for a look at a "different" way to travel.

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GOING SOUTH IN SEPTEMBER - Although it had been hoped that the club could sponsor another trip over the Black Hills Central Railroad this summer, it has been decided that such a venture is not feasible this year. So, instead, we will head in the opposite direction, and set our sights on . . . the GRAND CANYON!! Details are being worked out, but basically, this will be a four-day trip on September 6, 7, 8, and 9 and will involve traveling by chartered bus from Denver to Trinidad on the morning of the 6th, to board Amtrak's Southwest Limited for an all-day ride over the Santa Fe Railroad to Flagstaff, Arizona. Numerous attractions in the Flagstaff region including ghost towns and scenic areas will occupy one day of our two-day visit to Arizona. The other day will be spent at the Grand Canyon, and on the fourth day, we will return to Colorado again on the Southwest Limited, and on up to Denver. Details will be forthcoming.

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THE VIRGINIA DALE FIELD TRIP for June 30, is all set to go and will provide an opportunity to view a variety of rail and historic attractions in the northern front range area. We will meet in the parking lot of the Northglenn Shopping Center (Exit 221/104th Ave.) on the east side of The Denver, at 7:30 A.M., Saturday, June 30. Our first stop will be in Fort Collins at about 9:00 A.M. at the old FCM Ry. carbarn, to see the restoration work in progress on the City's Fort Collins Municipal Railway trolley car. A sister to the club's car at the Colorado Railroad Museum, it is presently stripped to the frame and undergoing rebuilding by a group of dedicated area residents that almost defies description. With volunteers doing the work and an impressive array of Colorado companies and individuals donating materials and services, it is hoped that the car may even operate again. After a quick tour of the old trolley route, out to the park, and a glance at the miniature train in the park, we will proceed north to Virginia Dale and stop at the roadside park for lunch. Please bring your own lunch and beverages. In the Virginia Dale area, we will view several impressive sections of the right-ofway of the DL&NW and visit the old Overland Trail Stage Station. Ken Jessen, who has studied the DL&NW extensively, will be with us to explain how the railroad graded through the area, but never laid a rail that far north. The Butte Royal Tunnel will not be visited since it recently changed ownership, and the new owners prefer not to have visitors on their property. the sections of grading we will see, including the stage station stop, are on private property.) Leaving the Virginia Dale area, we will then proceed south to Loveland, to glimpse the GW's Dinky steam locomotive, and then stop at North Lake Park to visit with Fred Lewis and ride his 18-inch gauge, Buckhorn Northern Railroad. Fred, with the help of friends, has done quite a job building this miniature railroad and its rolling stock, and his 2-4-4 is a sight to behold. Those who wish may then eat supper in the area or return home.

We suggest you keep car pooling in mind if you know of friends who are going. There is no charge or reservation required, just be at the shopping center in the morning. 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OUR NEXT FIELD TRIP on August 18, will take in part of the DSP&P as we drive over the Boreas Pass route from Breckenridge to Como, with a lunch stop on the pass. In Como, we'll look around the yard and then have supper, followed by a slide program depicting what it was like to ride a passenger train from Denver to Leadville. Further details next month.

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CLIFFHANGER DEPT. - As of May 22, only a week before the proposed discontinuance date of the Rio Grande Zephyr between Grand Junction and Salt Lake City, the railroad still had not received word as to the government's decision. The train was SOLD OUT throughout the entire month of May, with increased ridership, not only to Glenwood Springs and Grand Junction, but to Salt Lake City as well. (Frightful what a little publicity will do!!!)

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THE TOUR of the San Louis Valley Southern, postponed from April 7, has been rescheduled for Saturday, June 23. The railroad's motive power will be available for viewing, and an auto tour of the roadbed will be undertaken under the direction of the San Luis Valley Historical Society.

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'79 SUMMER SCHEDULE - The Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railway will begin its operating season June 9, and continue on through October 14. Fare is \$20 for adults and \$8 for children. Brochures can be obtained by writing to them at P.O. Box 789, Chama, N.M. 87520. Don't forget the Great Freight '79 special run on July 6, as described last month.

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THE SILVERTON SEASON begins on May 26, and will run through October 7. The exact fare will be \$13.85 for adults, and 8.35 for ages 8-11. Sale of the line is still under consideration, and a decision was to have been made at the railroad's board meeting the last week in May.

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THE SAN LUIS VALLEY HISTORIAN, published by the San Luis Valley Historical Society, recently included contributions from two club members. Carl Helfin wrote a story about the Chili Line of the D&RGW, and the Le Madera Branch which includes a synopsis of the branches physical characteristics and operations. 




Bryant McFadden and Ardie Schoeninger tend to the Rico, inside and out.



Bob Richardson, far left, and members of the museum prior to the work day when the shop car was being prepared for painting.




William Gould tackles the end of the shop car.




No, this isn't a train holdup, just some of the museum crew taking a pause while working on the No. 346.






