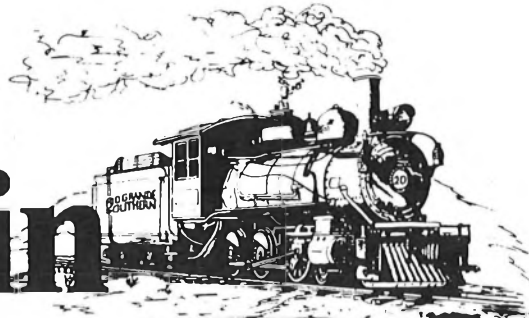

It was Mary who kept track of members so far as change of addresses, new members, deaths and membership numbers (a particularly time-consuming job), even when Carl was treasurer and all this was part of that position. It would be impossible to understate the importance that Mary represented to the Club and her death is a truly great loss to the Club and its members.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Loss...

Twice within a month, the membership of the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club has been shocked to learn of the death of a Club Officer's wife. In January, the death of Gini Lehrer, wife of Trip Chairman, Bud Lehrer stunned us. We will never forget Gini's cheerfulness and joyful companionship that so brightened last summer's European trip. Scarcely a month later, we learned of the death of Mary Carlson, wife of former Club president and Current Board member, Carl Carlson. Mary was also a Club officer, being in charge of membership. But, Mary did so much more for the Club. She was always quick to volunteer her considerable baking talents, if refreshments (particularly chocolate flavored ones) were needed. (Mary and I shared a passion for Frango Mints from Marshall Field's, in Chicago). When my "little brother," Jerry, first began to join Club functions, it was Mary who spoke to him and made him feel a real part of Club activities. She had that ability. We all loved Mary and Gini deeply and miss them terribly. Our most heartfelt sympathies go to Carl, Bud, and their families.

Loss of another kind is facing us. Passage of the Gramm-Rudman Bill by Congress late last year has ominous implications for Amtrak. This bill triggers automatic spending cuts in all areas of government, including Amtrak, if the budget deficit continues to grow. In a recent appearance on David Brinkley's "This Week in Washington" television program, White House Chief of Staff, Donald Regan, was the guest. When asked to name one domestic area of the budget that could be cut to relieve the deficit, he gave a one-word reply, "Amtrak!" Last year's battle to save Amtrak was nearly lost because Congress did not hear strongly, or often enough from rail passenger supporters. Have those who see the need for the world's richest nation to continue to support a passenger rail system grown apathetic or weary of the fight? Certainly, the next 12 months will tell.

RMRRC PRESERVATION FUND

A new committee has been formed in the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club. It will be dealing with the preservation of railroad items that the board feels should be restored, preserved and maintained in such a way that a part of history of railroadiana will not disappear from the landscape.

We are talking about such things as water tanks, depots, turntables, roundhouses, etc., not locomotives and rolling stock, although we are not ruling out anything at this point. An example is that in many communities, they have the manpower to do the painting, repair and replacement, etc., but do not have the funds with which to purchase the materials needed to do the work, such as the lumber, nails, and paint. It is the desire of the Club and Preservation Committee to raise the funds for such materials and to expend these funds to groups or organizations engaged in the restoration and preservation of such projects.

We would like to see this project begin here in Colorado first, and then, if the fund increases, move on to other projects in adjoining states in the Rocky Mountain region. One of our first projects might be to restore one of the last remaining water tanks on the narrow gauge main line of the Denver & Rio Grande, located in Sargent's, Colorado, on the Marshall Pass route which ran from Salida, over the pass and down to Gunnison and on up to Montrose. The owners of the land on which the tank sits would have the manpower to provide labor to do the needed repair and restoration, but cannot afford to buy the materials. Another project might be the depot in Fleming, Colorado. This is one of the last depots on the old CB&Q route and needs a new roof and paint job.

You have been advised previously about the establishment of this fund through the newsletter. We plan to increase the fund through a raffle-type drawing at each of our regular monthly meetings. Many fine books and railroad artifacts have been secured as prizes. It will, however, take some time to establish any reasonable

amount of funds with just this effort. We may consider additional projects to benefit the Preservation Fund, but the committee thought that each of our members might like to help get the Fund firmly established right away.

We have just over 1100 club members at this time and we thought that every member might wish to send just \$1.00 to help establish a workable fund, allowing the Club to get underway with some initial projects this Spring and Summer. Even in this economy, we feel that most can afford one dollar to preserve our railroad history. Won't you help? If every Club member sent in just \$1.00, we would have sufficient funding to do much this very year!!! Of course, we would be very grateful for any donations above the \$1.00 mark.

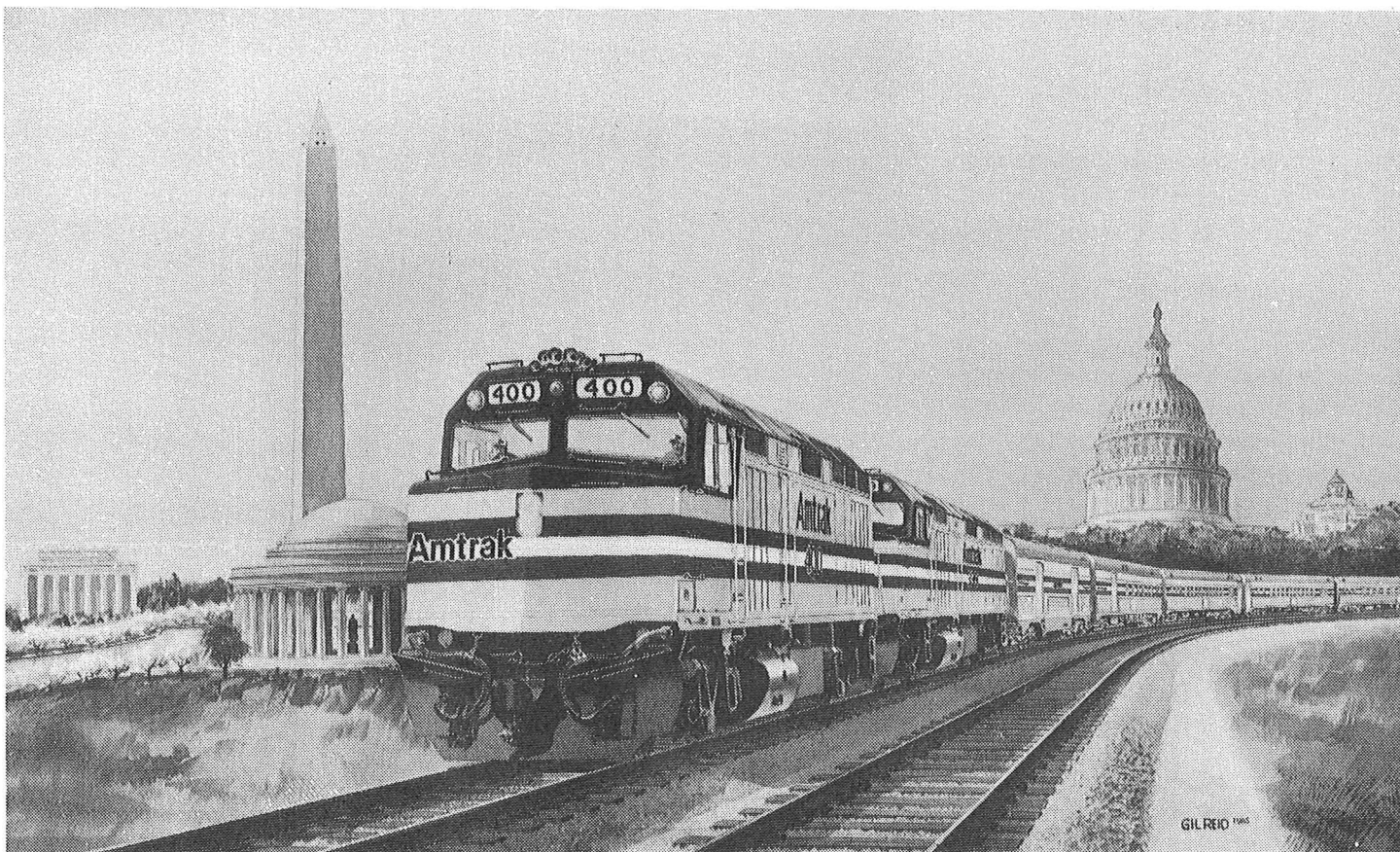

1986 AMTRAK CALENDAR

Amtrak's annual year-at-a-glance calendar for 1986 focuses, for the first time, on the nation's capitol city and pictures one of the top "name trains" serving it.

The train is the "Crescent," which stops in Washington on its daily 1,379-mile round trips between New York and New Orleans. It is Amtrak's longest-distance train in the East.

The painting, by rail artist Gil Reid, continuing in a series commissioned by Amtrak, portrays the Crescent headed south toward the Potomac River bridge. In the background is the cherry blossom-lined Tidal Basin and some of Washington's most famous landmarks--the Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial and Tidal Basin, Washington Monument, Capitol Building and the Library of Congress. Many of these may be seen from the train.

The painting is featured on the top por-

tion of the wall-size 23½-by-33½-inch calendar, showing all the year's dates at a glance.

Washington's Union Station, now undergoing extensive reconstruction (and not shown), is the third busiest of the more than 475 stations served by Amtrak on its 24,000-mile system. It is used by some 2.4 million Amtrak passengers yearly.

The Crescent, carrying more than 300,000 passengers yearly, is one of Amtrak's most popular long-distance trains. Intermediate stops south of Washington include Charlottesville, Va., Charlotte, N.C., Atlanta and Birmingham. North of Washington, intermediate stops include Baltimore and Philadelphia.

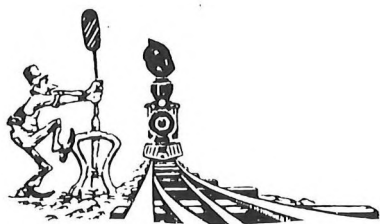

RMRRC AUTHORS

Fellow Club member, Bob Griswold, has completed a new book entitled Rio Grande along the Rio Grande which is now being printed and bound. Publication date has been set for June 1, 1986. Apparently, Bob has produced this in connection with the centennial celebration of Monte Vista.

The book features the history of the great San Luis Valley, and describes the important role of the Denver and Rio Grande Railway in developing Rio Grande County. The 200-plus-page volume is crammed with dozens of distinctive photos (Bob tells me it contains "loads of Thodes." Editor.), maps and drawings. Included is a complete history of Monte Vista's own railroad, the San Luis Central.
