

D&RGW SKI TRAIN EXCURSION

SATURDAY, MARCH 26, 1988

The Rocky Mountain Railroad Club has chartered a first-class parlour car on the D&RGW's recently re-equiped Ski Train. This parlour car is 1 of 14 cars recently purchased by the Anshutz Corporation. Our car will seat just 39 passengers, thus affording our group plently of room to sit back and enjoy the spectacular scenery as our train climbs 57-miles into the rockies.

Shortly after our 7:30 a.m. departure from Denver's Union Station, a nice, warm buffet breakfast will be served by our car's capable staff. The train is scheduled to arrive at Winter Park at 9:45 a.m. For those passengers who bring their downhill or cross country skis, they may begin their day's activity just a short walk from the train. The Club has arranged several activities for passengers who ekect not to ski. A chartered bus will take those interested to Fraser and Tabernash to photograph the Ski Train and Amtrak's California Zephyr. Upon returning to Winter Park around noon (lunch will be on your own), a short railroad movie will be shown in the lodge. After our 4:15 p.m. departure, complimentary snacks and beverages will be served to all aboard our parlour car.

Take a break from the "winter doldrums" and join the Club for this special ex-

cursion. Only 39 seats are available in the car, so book your seats early. Tickets will be sold on a first come, first served basis only. If there is enough interest in the excursion, the Club may be able to charter a second parlous car. 

December 28, 1987 marked a new era for the D&RGW as Santa Fe/Southern Pacific Corp. agreed to the Rio Grande's offer of \$1.8-billion (approximately \$1-billion in cash and \$800-million in debt assumption) to purchase Southern Pacific, a railroad six times the size of the Grande.

The Southern Pacific is made up of 13,000 miles of track with \$2.2 billion in revenues compared to the Rio Grande's 2,500 miles of track and \$300 million in revenues. This merger would create the nation's fifth largest railroad and, if approved by the ICC, the Rio Grande will acquire a network of potentially lucrative freight routes connecting it with major cities stretching from the West Coast to the Midwest.

The ICC has publicly stated that it will initiate a speedy review of the proposed merger. The five-member commission has decided that an expedited (six-month) review of the \$1.8 billion deal "will not compromise the right of parties to have their views heard", obviously referring the the several parties who are unhappy about the merger. These parties include The Henley Group, the biggest Santa Fe/Southern Pacific shareholder with a 15%


stake; the Kansas City Southern, a losing bidder, and the Railway Labor Executives Association, a union coalition that made a bid of about \$1 billion. The latter is being quickly taken care of by Anschutz to blunt its opposition and press the ICC for speedly approval.

NEW TOURIST LINE IN LEADVILLE

A news clipping sent by Club member, Albert Knicklebine of Pueblo, from The Chieftain and another from the Denver Post, advise rail fans of an unusual event these days. The Burlington Northern donated two diesel locomotives, four boxcars, five cabooses and other equipment totaling 20 cars to Stephanie and Ken Olsen to run a tourist line on the old Colorado & Southern (ex-Denver, South Park & Pacific) roadbed from Leadville to the Climax Molybdenum Company's mine at Climax, some 13.7 miles distance.

The new Leadville, Colorado & Southern RR Company, billed as America's highest standard gauge rail line, is scheduled to run excursions between Leadville and Fremont Pass this summer, officially opening by Memorial Day, if at all possible.

Climax is cooperating with the venture and will supply a turn-around track for trains. The town of Leadville seems to be generally excited about what this could mean to the town's economy.



NEWS ON THE CUMBRES & TOLTEC SCENIC RR

Clarence H. Quinlan died at his home in Antonito, Colorado on December 13, 1987, one day after his 79th birthday.

While the name will not register with the vast majority of railfans, Mr. Quinlan was one of the original group of people that fought to save that portion of the Denver & Rio Grande Western narrow gauge between Antonito, Colorado and Chama, New Mexico; what is today known as the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad.

At the time of the drive to save the line, Mr. Quinlan was serving in the Colorado State Legislature as Representative for the San Luis valley area. His hard work and considerable knowledge of the workings of the legislative process helped produce the enabling Act to buy the line in partnership with the State of New Mexico.

That purchase preserved this historic rail route for future generations to enjoy. Mr. Quinlan served on the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad Commission, the bi-state agency for the railroad from 1970 until his death. His long-time public service and his deep interest in the welfare of the narrow gauge will be greatly missed by all. (C&TS)

GET READY FOR THE RMRRC'S SPECTACULAR WEEK OF "RAILROADIN'" JUNE, 1988

CADILLAC & LAKE CITY EXCURSION

This is an additional installment of high-lighting the various trips of the two-week extravaganza celebration of the Club's 50th anniversary celebration.

Relive the days of the famed Rocky Mountain Rocket! The RMRRC has chartered a diesel-powered passenger special on the ex-Rock Island, Colorado Springs to Limon route now operated by the Cadillac & Lake City Railway. This route, formerly used by the Rocky Mountain Rocket, ran from Chicago to Limon as one train and at Limon, the train broke into two sections; one that traveled to Denver and the other to Colorado Springs.

On Tuesday, June 21, 1988, passengers will enjoy a 122-mile, all day excursion along this old Rock Island line. The excursion will leave Falcon, Colorado (just east of

Colorado Springs) in the morning. Several photo runbys will take place enroute to Limon. A hot lunch (included in the fare) will be served in the lunch-counter car.

A highlight of the trip as our special approaches Limon will be the crossing of the Union Pacific's Denver-Kansas City mainine. After a 1-hour layover in Limon, the train will depart westbound for Falcon with several more photo runbys scheduled on the way home. Our passengers will want to look for the sign designating "Tip Top" which marks the highest point on the entire Rock Island route.

Previous trips have been a great success and we believe this to be a "must" trip for rare mileage rail fans. Fans who like to ride old streamliner equipment should have a wonderful time due to the varied heritages of the C&LC's equipment. Although the exact consist has not been finalized, the consist may include ex-Burlington, Great Northern, Milwaukee Road, Norfolk & Western, Denver & Rio Grande, and, New

York Central equipment!

Once the train arrives back at Falcon, all passengers are invited and encouraged to meet at Guiseppe's Restaurant for dinner. This restaurant is located in the old D&RG Colorado Springs depot. Guiseppe's is an Italian restaurant, renoun for its Italian and American food, but also boasts of a great view of the D&RGW's mainline tracks between Denver and Pueblo on the Santa Fe/Burlington Northern (Colorado & Southern)/D&RGW jointline. Prices are moderate and checks will be handled on an individual basis. (Alan Greene)



NEWS FROM THE COLORADO RAILROAD MUSEUM


