MARCH PROGRAM

POTPOURRI NIGHT-- Well, we wern't disappointed! Our members came through, as we expected, and provided a truly great array of railroading subjects. The following report gives a brief description of each member's program:

JACK HETTINGER: 8mm movies of a wreck cleanup at Olathe, KS in June, 1940, showing engines, steam crane and track workers.

GET READY FOR THE RMRRC'S SPECTACULAR WEEK OF "RAILROADIN" JUNE, 1988

The San Juan Sojourn Field Trip is the last aspect of the two week Extravaganza that we will cover before the actual events are upon us.

The photographs used in this month's news-

letter represent only a very small part of what one can expect to see this week as we cover hundreds of miles of narrow gauge railroading.

We begin on Sunday, June 26th, exploring the grades of the famed Rio Grande Southern Railroad from Durango to Mancos to Dolores to Rico and, on to the summit of 10,222 foot Lizard Head Pass, finally resting for the night in Telluride.


On Monday, we will return to Lizard Head Pass and backtrack along the RGS roadbed to Trout Lake, then to Ophir and Vance Jct. From there, we will continue to Placerville and over Dallas Divide to Ridegeway. Our overnight spot will be Ouray, known as the "Switzerland of America".

Tuesday will find us spending the entire day exploring Otto Mear's famous "Three



The Coaling Dock and Pockets at Vance Junction. This is a fascinating structure and there is enough left to explain the full operation of coal loading from the upper, back level into the storage pockets for eventual engine use. A coal storage dock is also located on the upper back level.

While a few trestles still remain in tact along the RGS right-of-way, this one is the most spectacular and is located about a mile or so above the Trout Lake Water Tank, on the way to Lizard Head.

Little Lines", the Silverton Railroads. We will hike to Corkscrew Gulch Turntable as well as follow the roadbed over Red Mountain Pass to Red Mountain Town and on to Silverton. We will again stay overnight in Ouray.


While we concentrated on the Silverton Railroad on Tuesday, we will explore the other two railroads on Wednesday; the Silverton, Gladstone and Northerly RR (to Gladstone) and the Silverton Northern RR (to Eureka and Animas Forks). Again, we will return to Ouray for the night.

Thursday we head north to Montrose and then east to Cerro Summit and on to Cimarron to view the "278" display on the Crystal River Bridge, where the D&RGW left the Gunnison River via a side canyon to Cimarron. We will also visit the Forest Department's display and hospitality center

at Cimarron. Continuing on east, we will stop just west of Blue Mesa Dam to Visit Pine Creek Marina for a boat ride down Morrow Point Lake to see Chipeta Falls and the famous Curecanti Needle. We spend the night in Gunnison.

On Friday, we'll explore the Crested Butte area. The group will follow the DSP&P grade to its end on Ohio Creek near the coal mining town of Baldwin. We'll see the unfinished palisades of Ohio Pass which are almost as incredible as those on the west side of the line below Alpine Tunnel.

Finally, on Saturday, we will visit the Gunnison Historical Museum, home of the D&RGW's No. 268, as well as several other pieces of Rio Grande equipment, the Mear's water tank from the Marshall Pass line and the Sargents' Depot. To end our trip,

we will travel on to Sargents to view the water tank and proceed over Marshall Pass before heading back to Denver.

NO. 20 RESTORATION PROJECT

The Club continues to solicite funds to be applied to the restoration of the RGS No. 20. About \$35,000 will be needed to complete such work as new boiler sheeting, new cab, refurbishing of tender wrapper, sills and flooring, and, other necessary items to bring the engine closer to a point where actual consideration can be given to operate this engine. Naturally, this is just a start and represents only a small beginning to full operational refurbishing of the No. 20.

We think you will especially like the Seabees reconstruction photos along with some Karl Zimmerman photos and the "oldies" from the Public Service of Colorado archives.






NEWS FROM THE CUMBRES & TOLTEC SCENIC RR

The Rocky Mountai News has reported that a \$170,000 grant from the state of New Mexico assures funding for a dining hall to shelter tourists during their Colorado lunch stop on the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad.

The New Mexico legislature approved the grant in the session that ended February 18th. The Colorado Economic Development Commission earlier approved a \$170,000 dining hall grant for the tourist railroad, which the states own jointly.

The dining hall is projected to cost \$460,000, with \$120,000 already raised through ticket sales. It is planned for Osier, where passengers now eat outdoors on picnic tables at an elevation of 9,634 feet. Bids will probably go out in late May or early June, with construction to possibly start in late June when the area is more accessable. The Railroad, which will haul much of the material for construction, is scheduled to run daily from June 11 to October 16. (Carl E. C. Carlson)



FROM THE PRESIDENT

When I was born in 1935, every small town in Iowa, it seemed, was served by a railroad. I lived in Bondurant on the Chicago Great Western mainline where I learned about 2-8-2's, 2-10-4's and doodlebugs, all pulling baggage cars, coaches, and delivering mail. They had a fast night passenger train which I never did see. From 1930 til retirement in 1966, my father managed Co-op grain elevators in Iowa, depending on the railroad to furnish him with box cars to ship that grain. He always got box cars, regardless of how scarce they were, because he probably shipped more grain by rail than most other frain elevators. He introduced me to steam and allowed me to go to the town's depot to watch the trains come and go.


We could hear, some four miles to the south, the diesel sounds of the Rock Island, as the new streamliners passed through Altoona with their strange-sounding "whistles". My first train ride was on one of these "Rockets" to Chicago, where we picked up one of the first new cars made right after WW II. In 1947, we moved to Scranton where the double tracked main of the C&NW was located with their fancy fast UP/CNW passenger trains. They still had 2-8-2's for way freights and 4-8-4's for main line freights. We could hardly wait for those "new diesels", to replace those "nasty old steam engines". (Boy! Had I been brainwashed)

My second steam trip was on one of those freights. We moved to Malcom in 1953 for my senior year of high school and our Senior Class trip to Omaha was by Rock Island Rocket. While in college I worked in Yellowstone one summer, and, coming back to Denver to catch the train back to Iowa, we could see that "nasty" old steam on the Union Pacific in the form of Big Boys and Challengers. I figured I could get photos of them later on! After all, it was only 1956 and there was a lot of steam still around. In 1957, however, wierd sounds came from space to jar us awake and welcome us to the technology only dreamed about til now.

After graduation from college in 1958, and our first son in 1960, our move to Pueblo changed a few things. I suddenly discovered outside our apartment we had four passenger trains pass by every day (The Colorado Eagle and The Royal Gorge) but I still made the mistake of not taking any photos because "they would always be around". Besides, I was more interested in ghost towns, old mines, abandoned grades, and, narrow gauge, which was a bit more interesting since we never had that "stuff" in Iowa. Then, in 1962, I found out about the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club and joined, becoming member 900+ something. I took my first Club trip, a Memorial Day, 3-day Alamosa/ Durango/ Silverton and return narrow gauge trip. I chased C&S #638 in the Pueblo area, and, when I moved to Denver, I found out that a UP steam engine had been put back into service and was running steam excursions periodically for different groups, including our Club. In 1974, I finally had my first trip behind that engine and returned to "nasty old steam" power. Since then, I have tried to ride on many of our steampowered trips and even worked a few of them. There is still something thrilling and unique about a steam locomotive in its sounds and its whistle. Oh, I haven't given up on diesels either, because I find that no matter how computerized they are, and bear strange numbers of SD-60 and DASH-8-40C's, etc., I still like to photograph them and watch them as well.


My oldest son is not into trains like he used to be, but I figure he might be again when he gets a little older. You see, I have come full circle now...I have a new grandson, and, just as soon as he is able, I am going to introduce him to "nasty old steam". It might be the Santa Claus train at the Colorado Railroad Museum, but hopefully it will be on one of our Club steam excursions not too far in the future.



Ex-Alaska Railroad FP7A 1512 is shown with its companion 1510 on the ex-Union Pacific line from Wolcott, Wyoming to Saratoga. The locomotives, once again, are returned to service hauling lumber and wood chips from the tiny Wyoming town of Saratoga to the mainline of the UP at Wolcott. The locomotives are also used on the ex-Union Pacific line from Laramie to Walden, Colorado hauling coal as well as lumber and wood chips. Both lines are owned by Western Railroad Builders of Ogden, Utah, which operate the lines under the name of the Wyoming and Colorado Railroad, leasing the locomotives from Mountain Diesel Transportation (MDT) which has another twelve units in California. Engineer Ron Lyons indicated that the railroad is doing fairly well, as long as the weather cooperates with them. On the week of February 15th, both locomotives were buried in a drift a half mile long and 8 to 12 feet deep. After four days, the locomotives were finally extracted, but not until minor damage was inflicted upon one locomotive and \$9,000 dollars was spent for the removal of them from the drift. Engineer Lyons says that the line from Laramie to Walden remains blocked by 10 to 12 foot drifts as of this writing. He also said that he and his fellow employees are looking forward to May 21st when a passenger train will operate from Laramie to Walden with (Story and photograph by Steve Rasmussen) the Caritas on the back of the consist.

We again want to make note of a spectacular piece of video which comes from the Irv August films which are now the property of the RMRRC. WB Video (owned by Club member, Bill Brown) has outdone itself with this particular tape. As most Club members suspect, your editor leans heavily toward the narrow gauge, but I must admit, I have not searched far enough to what's available in standard gauge video. I thoroughly enjoyed The Fifties Express! It covers steam, first generation diesel and electrics on fifteen different railroads!!! It's simply great. Irv August (long-time Club member and past president) knew what he was doing with a 16mm camera and made sure he got around to photograph trains in their "golden age". I was fascinated by the unusual roads and consists, along with classic trains and engines. The following listing shows that there's something for everyone: Baltimore & Ohio, Pennsylvania RR, Norfolk & Western, Central Vermont, Nickel Plate, Western Maryland, Virginian, Boston & Maine, Edaville, New Haven, Duluth Missabe & Iron Range, Northern Pacific, Chicago Milwaukee & St. Paul, Canadian Pacific and Canadian National. 

THREAT TO CANADIAN PASSENGER TRAINS

VIA Rail Canada is threatened with serious cutbacks due to possible budget cuts by the Canadian P-rliament. The following measures are apparently under consideration:


--Replacement of the SUPER CONTINENTAL and the CANADIAN with a single tri-weekly transcontinental train.

- --Reduction of Maritimes service to one train from two.
- --Windsor/Sarnia-Toronto-Montreal/Quebec City corridor will be required to meet 100% of its costs through ticket prices.
- --Operation of expensice "coach-only" trains through the Canadian Rockies on daytime schedules, with overnight accomodations and box-lunch meals. (The Fast Mail) (Carl E. C. Carlson)

LIGHT RAIL TRANSIT CONTINUES TO GROW

The number of cities planning light-rail transit lines continues to grow. Maryland's Governor, William Schaefer, has announced a \$290-million, 27-mile line from Baltimore County through downtown Baltimore to Anne Arundel County, including service to BWI Airport. Funding will come primarily from state and local sources, and the line will be built over the next three years.

In Texas, voters in Houston have approved a \$2.57-billion transit improvement program that includes a 20-mile LRT line to connect the downtown with other business areas. Federal grants and private-sector contributions will provide 70% of the funding. The program also includes replacement of the 1,000-bus fleet, special bus and car-pool lanes, and road work.
