Our December program was a delightful film of the D&RGW archives that have found their way into the Club's vaults, entitled "Journey to Yesterday." This Paramount Pictures all-color production was conceived as a film of the making of a major motion picture called "Denver & Rio Grande." This was a production starring Sterling Hayden, J. Carroll Nash, Dean Jagger, Lyle Bettger and Zasu Pitts. Dean Jagger plays the part of General Palmer and the story deals with his trials in trying to push the fledgling Rio Grande Railway through the mountains--fighting the "bad guys," an underhanded bunch of toughs hired by a competing railroad.






Member Matzick presents the following information:

Ex-Coos Bay Lumber Company #11. 2-8-2T, built by Alco Schenectady, 12/29. Construction #68276. 44" drivers, 20x24" cylinders, 190# Boiler pressure, 35,200 pounds of tractive effort. Sold to Georgia Pacific (transfer ownership) in 1956. Now at Campo, CA. Owned by Pacific Southwestern Museum Association. Coos Bay #'s 9, 10, 11 and 12 were/are examples of Minarets type 2-8-2T locomotives.

[Editor's note: Thirty lashes with a limp carrot for misleading our readers about the locomotive manufacturer. Had it not been for this devious bit of misinformation we know that all 1000+ members would have gotten the right answer!! We would have then had to put out a new roster just to list all the correct respondents. We'll try to better research any future photos.]


# ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON THE "40-and-8" MERCI CARS

A few years ago, John Dillavou wrote an article regarding the "40-and-8" cars sent to the U.S. by the French. In 1949 the French government sent 49 of these cars in appreciation for the aid to France following World War II. The cars were distributed one each to every state and then territory of Hawaii. Each car contained gifts, including lace handkerchiefs, dolls, paintings, statues, furniture and desk ornaments. The United States had sent food "Friend Ships" to France.





The following represents notes from the Director's/Officer's Meeting held on

November 22, 1991:

TRIPS: Approval has not been received from the D&RGW for the LaVeta Pass trip to Alamosa and it is felt that this is probably not a viable trip option for 1992. The Anschultz group has indicated that it could possibly operate a trip to Craig (with the Ski Train Equipment) and an effort will be made to see if this can be substituted.

A meeting is scheduled with the U.P. after the first of the year to determine the feasibility of operating a UP steam trip in 1993.

A WYCO trip looks promising and may be run in conjunction with the UP Historical Society's operation of an "afternoon" steam run of the 3985 from Cheyenne to Laramie next summer. (The WYCO trip would be operated the following day.)

The possibility of an outing, or picnic, at the Colorado Railroad Museum was discussed for 1992 and tentative plans are to have one of our regularly scheduled Club meetings at the Museum.

TREASURER: Dr. Larry Lombard has stepped into this responsibility and noted that the Historical Foundation has received several donations in honor of Bert Bidwell. The Club has written all donors a letter of thanks and sent a list of these donors to Beverly Bidwell.

Larry feels that the Club's books were generally in such good condition that a

FYE Income/Balance Sheet will be easy to produce. Also, the Club's Financial Statement will be published in the <u>Rail Report</u> to advise members of the Club's financial condition in the near future.

CAR 25 RESTORATION: Darrell Arndt, who is very active in the restoration of Car 25 is now the "point man" on the restoration of Car 25. Also, we have asked Dave Waltrip, who had been very active on this project, to continue to give his expertise and assistance on the prject. Dave, who is President of Denver Rail Heritage Society, will still coordinate the utilization of Car 25, once it is restored, with DRHS.

FILMS & VIDEOS: Alva Morrison of Sunday River Productions spoke to the Board and stated that his tape on the Rio Grande Southern from the Club's Otto Perry 16mm film(s) was his second best selling tape-even though it was an expensive tape at \$69.95 and was 2 hours in length. The Club earns royalties of 20% of sales and through 1990 these royalties totalled over \$62,000.

Alva also stated that showing the Perry films is damaging to them and some method of preservation should be utilized to prevent their loss. He suggested utilizing BetaCam as a method of preservation.

Bill Gould and his son, Brian, will work towards the preservation of our collection.

PUBLICATIONS: A budget was approved for Bob Griswold to use in the publication of his book on Moffat Tunnel--which will be a book on more than just the construction of the tunnel but will also include much on the D&SL, most of which has never been published. The sale price of the book should be approximately in the range of the "Loop" book. The RMRRC will publish the book and hold copyright.

Steve Rasmussen is working with Bob Griswold on a possible update of Bob's book "Rio Grande--Along the Rio Grande." Steve has some excellent photos on LaVeta Pass for that section of the book and Bob may solicite help from other members to update other parts of the book, plus, fill a time-frame gap that is not covered by Steve's work. This update will be published by the RMRRC and the Club will then hold copyright to

the new, updated work.

The Club will be an exhibitor in "The Great American Train Show" which is scheduled for February 29 through farch 1, 1992.

In the past, we have had good results in the President's Day Wekkend Model Railroad Show at Buckingham Mail, but, to be in this, plus the Great American Train Show, we need volunteers to help man the display. If any member(s) can assist in manning our booth at these shows, please give Bob a call at (303) 756-7814, evenings.

EQUIPMENT AND PRESERVATION: Hugh H. Wilson (the senior) advised that Gerald Chase has a collection of rail, spikes, etc. that he would like to donate to the Historical Foundation. Hugh brought in one mounted display of rail and noted that Chuck Albi, Director of the Colorado Railroad Museum, would be happy to to display it at the Museum.


The Ft. Collins Municipal Railway Society has again expressed an interest in leasing our Ft. Collins Birney, No. 22. Although it would be an ideal situation for the Club to restore and operate this car, the probability of this happening is not good, and therefore, the car has been proffered to the Ft. Collins group with the following stipulations: A 20-year lease; Restoration must be completed within 5 years from the date of the lease; The car must be kept under cover at all times; Fiscal responsibility for the restoration must be proven to the Club's satisfaction before the lease is consumated; and Title of the Birney would remain with the Club with a plaque of ownership prominently displayed on or in the car.

ARCHIVES: Brian Bechtold, Hugh K. Wilson (the younger) and Roger Callender have volunteered to assume the responsibility of determining what the Club has in our office space at Union Station, plus many member's homes, and organize and make a list of this material, equipment, etc.,...

RAFFLE MANAGER: Roger Callender has agreed to assume the responsibility of the Club's Raffle Manager. This manager has to attend training classes and be certified by the Secretary of State and then file reports

of our "raffle" activities as required by the State. The State suggests that more than one person should be "certified," and if you have any interest in this endeavor, you might give Roger a call, 722-4733. [Editor's note: You're right, dear reader: this is "overkill" for what the Club does each month with the book drawing, but, it is the law--even though it will cost the State more to process our returns than the couple bucks of revenue we send in to them each month. Such is government!!]

As this is the end of my tenure as President of the Club, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your support of the Club while I had the privilege of being President. As you all know, officers, board members, and committee chairmen come and go, but it is the strength of these people and the support of the members that make the Club either strong or weak. I don't believe that I have ever had the pleasure of working with a more capable, finer group of people and I look forward to giving assistance as I am able in the future to support of the Club.
