

Trip leaders, Rich Dais and Tom & Cathy Lawry, prepared a fine outing on August 22, 1992.


Approximately 90 folks met in Ute Pass at Divide to cover Part II of the Colorado Midland tour. This year's adventure took us from Divide, through Florissant, past Lake George and into Eleven Mile Canyon where we would spend most of our time. Two outstanding features, in addition to a steak lunch at Ranniger's Roadbed Commissary, was the hike up to the top of the Rock of Ages (apparently used by the Colorado Midland as a tourist attraction in the late 1800's and early 1900's) to

get a breathtaking view of Eleven Mile Reservoir and Dam and South Park, as well as a view back down Eleven Mile Canyon, and, a hike to the top of the Eleven Mile Dam!! Carl Carlson made the arrangements with the Denver Water Board to get onto the property for our lunch and to visit the dam. Not since the Dam's construction in 1931, has any group been allowed to visit this place—the Rocky Mountain Railrpad Club was the very first!! Our thanks to the Denver Water Board and their caretaker, Eric Hibbs, and Carl for this very outstanding adventure.

After exploring the dam, the group departed for South Park and Hartsel where the Club obtained permission from the landowner

to visit the Midland Depot and out buildings. What had been a beautiful day then turned dark and cold and rainy and the tour was basicly stopped here although it had been planned to proceed to hwy 285 and visit the grade crossing of the Colorado Midland over the Denver, South Park & Pacific. While most turned around and headed home, a few die-hards did continue on to see the crossing and even follow the Midland roadbed up Trout Creek Pass.



COLORADO OPERATION LIFESAVER











