Our thanks to Doris for a most enjoyable program.





UNION PACIFIC STEAM — 1993

It was a memorable day on May 17, 1953, when the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club began its long association with the Union Pacific Railroad and mainline steam excursions. Behind UP Challenger #3967, the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club embarked upon these premier excursions with an exciting, neverto-be-forgotten trip from Denver to Laramie and return. It was with this trip that the Club developed its reputation for offering the finest photo runby opportunities on standard gauge, mainline steam excursions in the U.S.

In 1993, the Union Pacific Railroad and the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club will celebrate and commemorate the 40th Anniversary of this historic excursion. On Saturday, May 15, 1993, a stunning Union Pacific excursion train of approximately 18 cars, headed by giant Challenger steam power, will pull out of Denver Union Station for a long 300-mile round trip to Laramie, Wyoming. In true Rocky Mountain Railroad Club tradition, there will be many scenic mountain photo runbys on the UP's mainline over historic Sherman Hill.

Planning for this trip is underway and the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club is now negotiating with the Union Pacific. This memorable trip will be one not to be missed. 

REVENUES CHART



DENVER RAIL HERITAGE SOCIETY OPERATING SECOND TROLLEY

The "Platte River Trolley," operated by the Denver Rail Heritage Society, now has a scond car in service, leased from the Gomaco Trolley Company, Ida Grove, lowa. The car arrived in Denver the week of October 12th and was on display at the old Union Pacific Freight House at the corner of 19th and Wynkoop Streets in lower Downtown Denver for the ground-breaking of the new Coors Field baseball stadium on October 16th.


After the ground-breaking ceremony, the #1978, an authentic ex-Melbourne, Australia streetcar, beautifully restored by Gomaco craftsmen, was transported with a Denver

Police escort to 12th Avenue and Newton Street where it was unloaded from a custombuilt lowboy trailer onto the trolley track. The track at that location is the historic and long-remembered Denver-to-Golden interurban commuter route which ended passenger service in 1950. The #1978, an enclosed car, painted a rust red and cream, 48-feet in length with center doors and longitudinal seating, pulls or pushes a diesel generator mounted on a two-axle, fourwheel carriage to provide its power. It is equipped with trolley poles for overhead electric operation.

The #1978 was brought in especially for a two-week period to operate during "Trick or Treat Street" week during Holloween at the Children's Museum to provide an enclosed enviornment in case of bad weather

through the end of October, mainly since the Society's other workhorse, trolley #1977, is an open car and operations had to be suspended in October, 1991, due to freezing weather during Holloween.

Rocky Mountain Railroad Club members who are volunteer operators (Motormen and Conductors) with the Society obtained valuable experience in operating the #1978 as it allowed them to familiarize themselves with an enclosed car and a diesel/generator trailer which is exactly what they will be running when the Club's #25 is operational. THE EFFORT CONTINUES

As 1992 draws to a close, the No. 25 restoration committee can take pride in the accomplishments made during the year on this most imposing project. Our goals for a given period always seem to elude us and this year was no exception. However, work continued through the summer, a feat never before attained, and we keep "plugging away." It is always easy to look at the car at any given time and wonder if anything has been accomplished lately, but much of the work done is preparation work necessary for the final assembly of the parts and does not always "stand out" until later. The roof is about ready to be put on, the siding on one side will be cut in a few weeks and prepared for the right side, the electrical work is progressing nicely, the No. 1 end is starting to go back together and much interior wood has received the six or more coats of varnish required. This winter should be an exciting time on the project as we begin to do more "fun" type of work such as putting on the

canvas roof, wiring the controllers, putting on the siding, etc. and getting away from all that confounded sanding and expoxy work. We have received some fine publicity this year beginning with the Colorado Timetable and followed by Lakewood Sentinel, the Rocky Mountain News (including a color reproduction of Joe Priselac's painting highlighting the article) and the NRHS Intermountain News! In recent months, several new volunteers have joined the group which will make a big difference in coming months and "regulars" who have taken the summer off or diverted some of their attention by helping with the Platte Valley Trolley will be coming back to "full time.' We have been "boosted" by a number of donations this past year from a number of companies. Most notably was Furniture Refinishing, Inc.'s contribution of \$700 worth of wood stripping and Robert and Russel Lawrence's donation of a mint condition interurban "Golden Glow" headlight once used on the Denver-Golden route. The recent No. 25 Project Raffle of a "G-Scale" trolley car, donated by Caboose Hobbies of Denver, brought in about \$300. Several other donations are anticipated in materials and hardware. (Do you have any artifacts that could be put to use on No. 25, such as marker lamps, reversing lever, etc.???) Remember, the Rocky Mountain Railroad Historical Foundation is approved by the IRS as 501(c)3 and contributions are tax deductible!! [Editor's note: It should be made clear that, while the RMRRC is basical-Ty funding the No. 25 Project, the No. 25's ownership has been transferred to the Foundation and any donations made toward this project and the Foundation are always 100% tax deductible]

SpikeBuck by Clay Rollins

The Burlington Northern's SD60MAC locomotives are back in the news. 9500-02 have been back in town conducting tests for EMD on the Joint line between Denver and Colorado Springs starting November 2nd. The engines feature AC traction technology from Siemens. During testing, the units are attached to the point of a Southbound coal load load in front of the train's assigned power. GM Engineers monitor the locomotives from an EMD test car wired up behind 9502. Two ground monitor stations are also used at Castle Rock and Monument. The helpers, normally cut off at Palmer Lake, continue with the train to Colorado Springs. The Helpers then couple to the AC engines to pilot them light back to Denver, with the coal load continuing as normal. At this writing, the testing has lasted a week.....ATSF 800's continue to appear almost daily on the Santa Fe's single daily train to Denver, the "Rocket." These warbonnet painted engines are still being delivered, so many visiting town are in factory-fresh paint for the benefit of local photographers.....The SP has completed the dismantling of the old main line and adjacent yard tracks on the east side of Burnham shops. This is in preparation for the MAC light rail right-of-way which will follow the old main to South Denver Jct. This portion of the MAC will be built first and used for fleet testing. Look for construction to start in December. In other MAC news, the five track maintenance facility has had its foundation and inspection pits poured.....The UP has announced that it wants to run rail service to downtown from the new airport. Several sources have mentioned speeds of up to 79MPH, but where on this heavy industrial line with multiple grade crossings, and a couple of tight curves will they achieve that speed is open to speculation, or a lot of capital improvement.....The Platte Valley Trolley has leased GOMACO trolley #1978 (ex-Melbourne, AS, W2 class) for two weeks. After three weeks, it is still in town. Rick McNeal is doing his best to hang onto it!
