The Club would greatly appreciate if all of our members renew by the end of year. We do allow for a month grace period. The re-sequencing of seniority numbers is performed in February.

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
### **Notice Of Annual Meetings**



fer discounts and advance notice to our Club members.

Governor Bill Richardson announced on October 20, 2010, that he has directed the New Mexico Department of Transportation to use up to \$1.1 million to repair the Lobato Trestle on the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad. The historic trestle was damaged this past summer in a fire that forced the suspension of regular trains from Chama to Cumbres Pass. The funds come from federal Transportation Enhancement money that is eligible for the restoration of historic rail bridges. Ridership income on the railroad is down by at least 25% over last year. Many local businesses have closed since the fire. The railroad has had to deal with various unexpected costs due to the situation, and donations can be made via the Friends of the C&TS



In Silverton, Colorado, D&RGW engine #315 and the "Casey Jones" railbus were moved into the Silverton Northern engine house in October. D&S crews have been helping out with the switches and trackwork. Silverton Northern 2 axle caboose #1005 has come home from a ten year stay in the Durango

yard. A Sunnyside Mine 3' gauge steel flat car will be used to move heavy items out of the engine house and serve as a platform to move the SN caboose inside for restoration work. The Narrow Gauge Preservation Society has offered to match up to \$10,000 in funds to the Durango Railroad Historical Society in support of the Silverton Northern trackage project, which includes restoring the pits and

Manitou & Pikes Peak Railway in Colorado has steam locomotive #4 running again for the first time since 2004. No regular schedule has been announced as of now.

News from the Denver, South Park & Pacific Historical Society. The matching funds requirement for the \$35,000 phase 2 grant was again successfully met and the sum of \$13,362 was sent to Colorado Preservation Inc. to disburse to the contractors accordingly. Mike Perschbacher has just finished the final foundation and structural work on the Como depot. October saw the start of rebuilding 3 of the original 4 chimneys. They will continue to raise (matching) funds to maximize use of CDOT funds

and do all they can in this regard to keep the project moving forward, but 2011 may see limited progress. This is due to changes in grant procedure with the State Historical Society. Also, the society has acquired title to Litchfield-built boxcar DSP&P RR number 608 from the Boulder County Railroad Historical Society, with the intent to cosmetically restore it to its as-built appearance. It is currently stored in the Como roundhouse, and will continue to reside there. Visit their website at [www.dspphs.org](http://www.dspphs.org) for the latest photos and updates.

It has been one hundred years since the last trains rolled through the Alpine Tunnel in Colorado. Penn Station in New York City has also reached its centennial mark. Some of the rolling stock from the collection in Boulder County, Colorado has been moved to Kansas.

At the Georgetown Loop railroad, Phil Johnson will soon be the superintendent again after serving as the Chief Mechanical Officer (CMO) at the CRRM in recent years. The Museum's new CMO will be Jack Campbell, who has been the shop foreman.

After two years of fundraising and planning, standard-gauge 1909-built D&RGW wood box car 62962 arrived in Portola, California on October 5, 2010. The move from the Western Railway Museum at Rio Vista to WP Railroad Museum Portola took all day, and the carbody was placed back on its trucks the next morning. It was built by American Car & Foundry in 1909 as part of the D&RG 62000-63499 series with steel underframe, double-sheathed wood sides & ends. Rebuilt by D&RGW with new steel ends, sheet steel-clad roof, and steel-bound doors in 1926. A few of the cars worked into the 1950's, some even later in Maintenance of Way service system-wide, and six of them were rebuilt into yard cabooses 01320-01325.


Greenbrier Rail Services has purchased 34 acres to build a railroad wheel repair

shop near North Platte, Nebraska. Plans are to build a 49,000 to 50,000 square foot building to house an operation that will be the most modern wheel shop in North America. Construction is expected to be completed by April 2012, and the new plant will bring about 30 jobs to the area. The Union Pacific Railroad is their largest wheel-set customer, and has the world's biggest freight yard here.


Fort Worth, Texas, has received a \$34 million grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to make much-needed upgrades to the Tower 55 rail intersection, which often features long lines of trains waiting for their turn to pass.

## Narrow Gauge Locomotive Photo Gallery




Less than six months after the Colorado & Southern Railway came into existence they sold a former South Park Mogul (C&S 20) to the Catskill & Tannersville Railway in June 1899. The Brooks locomotive was built in 1882 as DPSP&P 38, it later became DSP&P 165 as well as DL&G 165. This line in the Catskill mountain region in New York state hauled tourists to Kaaterskill Falls and was less than six miles long. This locomotive was retired in 1907 and the railroad went bankrupt in 1918. – Photo from the James L. Ehrnberger collection.




C&S Engine 31, 2-8-0, built by Baldwin in January 1880 was sold to the Edward Hines Lumber Company in 1902. This locomotive was originally DSP&P 51, then number 191. In 1889 it became Denver Leadville & Gunnison 191. The locomotive is on display today at the Colorado Railroad Museum and it is the oldest locomotive in Colorado. The locomotive is shown here at Rhinelander, Wisconsin, on August 23, 1942. – Photo from the James L. Ehrnberger collection.

## Narrow Gauge Locomotive Photo Gallery



C&S number 50 was one of several narrow gauge consolidations traded to Morse Brothers Machinery Company in Denver for three former Denver Boulder & Western locomotives. This engine was built by Cooke in 1883 for the Denver South Park & Pacific. It was originally number 62, then became the 211 on the South Park and the DL&G. The engine is shown here in Denver at the time of the trade in 1921. – James L. Ehernberger photo.



C&S engine 55, a consolidation built by Cooke in 1883 for the Denver South Park & Pacific was sold to The Milwaukee Railroad in May 1918 where it operated on the Bellevue and Cascade Railroad, a 36-mile line in Iowa. The line was abandoned in 1933 and the rails were removed in 1936. The locomotive is shown here in Bellevue in June 1932. – Photo from the James L. Ehernberger collection.
